


Our community commitment to caring for each other makes us stronger and we are proud of the sustained efforts of PhillySEEDS, to effect long-lasting positive change and provide PHA residents with truly life-changing options, through its many programs – including homeownership.

# 193 FIRST TIME HOMEBUYERS ARE NOW FORMER PHARESIDENTS



## Homeownership and Independence

#### PhillySEEDS Homeownership Closing Cost Assistance

Since the program's inception, PhillySEEDS has provided over \$368,000 grant dollars to 193 first time homebuyers who are now former PHA residents.

Homeownership is a major step towards independence and enables the new homeowner to change ideas, improve neighborhoods, and be an example to others who may be hesitant to leave the "safety net" of public housing.

Instead of leaving a legacy of often multigenerational dependence on public housing, with the limitations and challenges of such federally-funded assistance, a new homeowner can leave a tangible legacy – of truly "taking ownership" and passing down that property and mindset to other generations.

PhillySEEDS provides a mortgage closing costs match of up to

two thousand dollars (to match the savings of the homeowner) for its approved first-time PHA homeowners. This boost at the end of the process of buying a home dovetails with the extensive preparation that each PHA homeowner goes through, sometimes for years, to be prepared for responsible and successful homeownership.

In 2021, PHA worked with over 1,000 residents to complete homeownership counseling courses in partnership with housing counseling agencies where they saved \$2,000 through new budgeting skills, completed credit counseling to obtain at least a 620

middle credit score, received oneon-one housing counseling, and obtained a pre-approval letter from a lender or bank.

For many, the next step is another daunting one – to obtain the extra funds to complete the required closing costs, which is where PhillySEEDS can provide assistance, and used all its budgeted funding in 2021 to help 38 former PHA residents buy their own homes. This 38 is out of 67 that was the PHA total in 2021 for homeownership sales.

And we could do more, if we had more funding!



# PhillySEEDS Homeownership Highlight

## **DWAYNE FAIR**

Mr. Dwayne Fair bought the North Philadelphia home that his family had leased for nearly 52 years from the Philadelphia Housing Authority. When Mr. Fair's mother had become ill in 2012, she asked her children to buy the home that the family had lived in as part of PHA's scattered-site housing program. She had moved eight children into that home in 1968, and, since then, its memories had become woven into the family's history.

After completing a step-by-step plan created with a support team from PHA staff and its partners, Dwayne Fair purchased the home on March 26, 2021 – following a journey that dramatically changed his life.

He trained to do electrical work as part of the by Trades for a Difference program and received OSHA 10 certification, positioning him for a better-paying job; he received credit counseling from Clarifi, raising his credit score from the low 600s to nearly 800; and he attended housing counseling classes, which prepared him to meet some of the unexpected challenges that homeowners can face.

As a required part of PHA's homeownership readiness process, all participants save \$2,000 through new budgeting skills, and complete credit counseling to obtain at least a 620 middle credit score. With his new found savings, Mr. Fair was able to utilize the PhillySEEDS Homeownership Closing Costs assistance grant where he received a \$2,000 grant that filled in the financial gap for his mortgage closing and he was able to fulfill his mother's dream (and his), to purchase the property from PHA, which now truly is his family home.



# PREPARING SUCCESSFUL HOMEOWNERS!

Of course, there is more to successful homeownership than delivering a set of keys to a new home. There will be a mortgage, repair bills, maintenance items, utility bills, and maybe even a lawn that will need attention!

To make sure that PHA's first-time homeowners will be prepared and successful as homeowners, PHA has the Opening Doors to Affordable Homeownership Program, for eligible Public Housing residents and Housing Choice Voucher participants. The training includes: learning the importance of credit, budgeting, and personal goal mapping; understanding the homeownership sales contract, mortgage documents, and loan products; becoming familiar with the housing search process, home inspections, home maintenance basics, pre-foreclosure and foreclosure prevention, home weatherization and much more. Participants are eligible for a range of PHA homeownership grant

and subsidy programs to help ensure affordability and long-term success as homeowners, including:

- Assisting in developing realistic and attainable plans to reach their goals;
- Providing credit counseling, financial literacy, basics of homeownership financing and closing, housing search and long-term responsibilities of homeowners:
- Supporting residents in finding housing in areas of opportunity suited to the household's needs and goals;
- Providing assistance in securing homeownership financing and in the homeownership closing process; and
- Helping to ensure a successful homeownership experience through pre and post-purchase counseling and support.



Since the PhillySEEDS Homeownership Closing Cost Assistance Program began, PhillySEEDS has provided over \$368,000 grant dollars to 193 first time homebuyers:

For the past 12 months, Shaneen Allen, a former Housing Choice Voucher resident, had a main goal of becoming a homeowner in the City of Philadelphia. Ms. Allen performed the necessary training requirements of credit and housing counseling, saving her money, and being very selective in finding a good home that was affordable.

Through PHA's partnership with Jumpstart Philadelphia, Ms. Allen was able to purchase a rehab property at an affordable price that was 25% below the current market rate. Unexpectedly, during the middle of her homeownership process, her lender shut down its mortgage division and implemented additional guidelines to their mortgage program. With the added restrictions, Ms. Allen faced a significant financial gap with her closing costs and the possibility of not being able to buy her chosen home. However, PhillySEEDS immediately assisted Ms. Allen through its Homeownership Closing Costs Assistance program, which allowed her to become a proud first time homeowner!




# PHILLYSEEDS RENTAL SECURITY DEPOSIT PROGRAM PROVIDES MATCHING FUNDS FOR IMPROVED HOUSING OPTIONS

The housing choice voucher ("HCV") program, also known as Section 8, has been the federal government's major program for assisting very low-income families, the elderly, veterans, and the disabled to afford decent, safe, and sanitary housing in the private market at a subsidized rate.

However, to access the the private rental market, renters are required to provide at least two months' rent as a security deposit. With HCV residents having low-to-moderate incomes, many need assistance in fulfilling their security deposit requirement.

PhillySEEDS offers security deposit assistance at a dollar-to-dollar match of the resident's security deposit savings, up to \$2,000. PhillySEEDS recipients also receive credit and budget counseling from a housing counseling center certified by the City of Philadelphia, where they learn to budget their income and monthly bills for future affordability.





## PhillySEEDS Rental Security Deposit Highlight

#### **ANGEL BOYER**

Ms. Boyer pursued working with the Housing Opportunity Program ("HOP") at PHA in hopes of finding a new home in a safer neighborhood. That program is a housing mobility initiative aimed at assisting families participating in the HCV program to explore housing choices and move to Opportunity Areas in Philadelphia and surrounding counties.

The neighborhood where Ms.
Boyer was living had a number of shootings and various other safety issues, so she wanted to move in order to be able to raise her children in safety and live in a more secure environment – as well as to have easy access to an affordable grocery store with good quality food, which wasn't an option in her neighborhood.

Through HOP, Ms. Boyer was referred to a home in the Mt. Airy section of Philadelphia. She really liked the neighborhood and believed there would be more favorable opportunities for her and her children. Ms. Boyer was working and had some money saved but did not have enough for the full security deposit.

But her situation was just the type of scenario for which PhillySEEDS had created the Rental Security Deposit Program, through which an HCV program participant could receive a match of up to \$2,000 for a required security deposit.

Ms. Boyer was able to utilize the PhillySEEDS match for her security deposit and move to a community that she enjoys and feels offers her family a better quality of life.

# GOAL OF \$75,000!

Our fundraiser for 2022 is for our PhillySEEDS Homeownership Closing Cost Assistance Program, to increase the number of first-time homeowners that PhillySEEDS can assist on their road to housing independence.

PhillySEEDS used all of its budgeted funds in 2021 to provide closing cost assistance grants to 38 residents, so that they could purchase their first home. But more prospective homeowners could have benefitted from the up to \$2,000 match grant for mortgage closing costs, were more funds available.

We have set a goal for 2022 of raising \$75,000, which could double the number of homeowners we are able to assist. Not only does this completely change their lives but it also results in additional units being made available for the thousands of people awaiting affordable housing through PHA.

Our federal funds for PHA housing may be limited, but the determination of our future first-time homeowners, with the training tools and supports in place, combined with the PhillySEEDS grant, can be a real game changer. The future would not be simply to remain in public housing, with its various restrictions and limitations, but to become a proud property owner, involved in a community as a stakeholder, and creating a legacy of achievement.

PhillySEEDS' Homeownership Closing Cost Assistance program supports and empowers PHA residents' dreams of home ownership. When residents gain financial wealth and independence through real estate ownership and have the ability to pass that wealth down to their family members, we strengthen our entire community.



#### PHA'S VAUX COMMUNITY BUILDING AND ITS PROGRAMS ARE A LYNCHPIN IN **CONTRIBUTING TO THE COMMUNITY**

PHA's Vaux Community Building has evolved in less than a decade from a beautiful, huge, but unused, building with a historic past of significance to the community, to a renovated, vibrant community resource for education, training, health services, and more, as financed and developed by PHA.

PhillySEEDS was involved with that transformation as of when it began, subsidizing the first class of students at the Vaux Big Picture High School, a projectbased school that launched at Vaux in 2017 with just 9th grade and now has all four high school grades. That student support from PhillySEEDS continues to this day.

Then, in 2019, after PHA received the EnVision Center designation for the Vaux Community Building from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, use of that space expanded exponentially to benefit PHA residents and the community and highlight several initiatives by PhillySEEDS.

In the spring of 2019, PHA, PhillySEEDS, and partners launched a comprehensive Workforce Development Center at Vaux, providing: a "one stop shop" for job readiness, employment and training, financial literacy, homeownership counselling, and other services for PHA and neighborhood residents.



Also, special thanks are extended to CVS, which provided a donation to PhillySEEDS in the amount of \$60,000, to assist in the overall job training programs that CVS Pharmacy promotes. The average cost of CVS Pharmacy's training programs is \$1,250 per person.

This donation will help secure the ability of PHA residents to enroll in upcoming job training programs, which focus on educating students in different CVS Pharmacy job opportunities such as Customer Service, Pharmacy Technician, and Insurance.





#### THE WORKFORCE CENTER AND PHILLYSEEDS WORKFORCE TRAINING FUND

#### The Workforce Center

Established in 2019, the PHA Workforce Center contains workforce navigators and homeownership counselors, whose main duties are to support PHA residents achieve their economic and educational goals and it is open to the community, for those seeking to increase their self-sufficiency via job placement and training opportunities, educational advancement, the first time home buyer program, and entrepreneurship services.

The Workforce Center offers skill-building workshops, bridge programs to hone academic skills, and a jobs bank to connect them directly with open positions and employers. Career training opportunities include: Bookkeeping; IT Training; Network Technician; Carpentry; CDL-Truck Driving Part A and B; HVAC; Phlebotomy Technician; Plumbing; Nursing Aide Training; Building Maintenance; Medical Billing; Residential and Commercial Electricity; Business Administration; Pharmacy Technician; Dialysis Technician and many more. Private and public partners joined with the authority in providing college scholarships, career training, and a job bank that connects residents directly to employers with openings.



#### **PhillySEEDS Workforce Training Fund**

In order for individuals to be enrolled in the various training program opportunities available through the Workforce Training Center, funding is needed. There are a number of training programs, some of which have funding available but for limited amount of enrollees, and other programs may not have any funding defined for applicants (for less popular careers paths). But, for all of the training programs, the expectation is that the result will be real, fulltime jobs –with benefits, at a starting hourly rate of \$16.00/hr.

Enrollment into the PhillySEEDS workforce training program includes financial and banking literacy education through our partner, Santander Bank, with one-on-one counseling and mentoring, as well as having a savings account with the bank. Successful completion of the program allows for receiving a maximum of \$3,000 with a 3:1 dollar match based off the amount in the program participant's savings account with Santander Bank and those grant dollars can be used towards the cost of a Workforce training program or Education/certification program.

The matching dollars can only be used towards the cost of a job training program or education program tied to employment advancement like certifications.

Upon completing the job training, a job opportunity will be available through the training program's employer connection or readily available in the chosen field of training.

With the cost of specific workforce training and education classes at an all-time high, potential program participants have had to be turned away. Therefore in 2020, PhillySEEDS created its fourth program, called the PhillySEEDS Workforce Training Fund, to provide funding for additional opportunities and assistance to PHA residents/program participants.


